First month of winter, the days are dark and the moon is hanging low, long into the morning. This year's winter solstice is on June 21 at 10.07 pm, Nelson.

At this time the sun is at it's most northerly point in the sky. At the middle of the day it reaches it's lowest altitude, from the northern horizon for the year.

Thousands of people celebrate the event around the world, including in New Zealand, where the winter solstice traditionally marked Matariki. A cluster of stars which rises in mid winter and is for many Maori the start of a new year. Good news from now on the days will slowly start to get longer again.

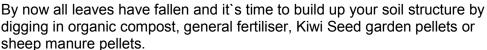

Out in the garden



Gypsum helps to improve the soil structure as it breaks the clay. A little now and then onto the compost pile along with lime also helps to produce a friable, fertile soil.

Fibre Earth Mulch is a great natural and ecological friendly way to supply nutrients, weed suppression, moisture retention at the same time. Ideal in no dig gardens and you can plant your seedlings straight into the mix with topsoil.

By the way broccoli, broad beans, cabbage, cauliflower, carrots, onions, peas, spinach, garlic and shallots is what you can plant now. Cover crops such as lupins and oats are great green manure crops and are usually worked into the soil late winter.



On a cold day take the time to look after your garden tools. Give a good clean with bicarbonate of soda. Sharpening of secateurs and adding some drops of oil are necessary to do a good pruning job.

It's also time to start pruning your fruit trees and flowering shrubs—once they have finished flowering. Remember to seal larger pruning cuts with pruning paste to protect your trees from diseases.

Looking after your indoor plants can also be done while it's too cold outside – trim back roots and replant into fresh potting mix mixed with a teaspoon of neem and some crumbed up garden pellets or other fertiliser. Give water as required, keep their leaves dust free and place them close to the window so they can get as much light during the short days as possible.

Fresh herbs on the windowsill can be harvested through the winter as needed and are great sprinkled on meals or enjoyed as teas.
